

STAT OF THE WEEK

In 1914, students who studied Latin scored 29% higher in all subjects in standardized tests than non-Latin students. From 1957-1973, there was a 79% decline in the number of students studying Latin, paralleled by a 33% decline in national SAT tests scores. In the late 70's, Washington, DC schools introduced Latin again, and saw the Latin students score 144 points higher than the national average. From 2000-2007, there has been a gradual, 13-point improvement in the verbal SAT scores for Latin students, while students of all other foreign languages remain lower and constant. (That cinches it: the study of Latin is push-ups for the brain!)



- **3. Decline to Sign:** If the ballot initiative language is "certified" so that proabortion supporters can start collecting signatures, <u>DO NOT SIGN</u> any petition to allow abortion to be enshrined in the state constitution on the November 2024 ballot.
- **4. Promote Voter Registration:** Encourage young people and other new voters to register. Help at a registration drive in your community or ask your pastor if you can organize one at your parish.
- **5. Help Those Wounded by Abortion:** Encourage those affected by abortion to reach out for compassionate help and healing at archstl.org/hope-healing.
